




Academic year 2003/04 (Open Doors 2005)

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International Students in Germany




In addition there are 60.000 Students with foreign passports but who are permanent residents in Germany and have graduated at a High School in Germany (so called "Bildungsinländer").

During the past seven years the number of International Students has risen by 70% and now reaches the political target of 10% of the total student body. Germany is now the third largest host country for international Students. The number of German Students will rise by up to 20% during the next decade.





International students in the U.S.







- 232 member universities 124 student bodies






The DAAD has...

- (Co-)responsible for "uni-assist"






The DAAD has 60 regional and local offices world-wide, more than 400 lecturers abroad and 80 Alumni Clubs.








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DAAD-funded academic exchange with the US in 2005

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Short Term Stays for American students example 1: Summer Courses at German universities

(Hochschulsommerkurse)

Profile and Terms of Award

- ✓ combining language, academic topics and leasure activities.
- ✓ about 300 in 2007, more than 50 of them in English.
- ✓ A number of scholarships of approximately €770 each are available for courses lasting a minimum of three weeks.
- ✓ An international travel subsidy of €210 will also be awarded and will likewise be disbursed upon arrival.



Short Term Stays for American students example 2:

RISE - Research Internships in Science and Engineering

The Ph.D. students

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- offer projects which are of benefit to their own research work.
- They take responsibility if there are any problems (e.g. housing, administrative needs, social integration).



The US student

- gets practical and theoretical insight into a research project.
- cooperates with young Germans on a daily basis.
- has access to the social network of the research group.




Short Term Stays for American students example 2: RISE – facts and figures

In 2006:

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- 380 project proposals605 applications from the U.S. and Canada
- 212 scholarships


Programs working both ways example 1: Group study visits

(Gruppenreisen)

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- ✓ Group of 10-15 students (plus one accompanying faculty member)
- ✓ DAAD subsidizes room and board
- \checkmark Applications submitted to DAAD New York



- ✓ Studienreisen, Studienpraktika
- ✓ Group of 5 to 15 students (plus one accompanying faculty member)
- \checkmark DAAD subsidizes room and board
- ✓ Applications submitted to DAAD Bonn





A Program to intensify cooperation between German faculties and university departments worldwide

- \checkmark The partnerships are arranged for specific fields.
- ✓ Credits are accepted, tuition fees are (partly) waived.
- \checkmark Applications are submitted by the German university.
- The DAAD provides financial support for the German students and the German partner institution.



Programs working both ways example 2: ISAP - Program Design

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History:	The program was launched in 1979 and has since been modified on numerous occasions.
Funder:	Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF)
Applicants:	German universities
Global objective:	To raise the international profile of German universities by funding permanent, self-sustaining cooperation projects between German and foreign partner universities
Partner countries:	All countries apart from those that qualify for funding under the EU mobility programs Socrates/Erasmus
Instrument:	Mobility funding



Programs working both ways example 2: ISAP - Prerequisites for Funding

- ✓ Student groups made up of at least 3 participants
- $\checkmark\,$ Matriculation at the home and host university
- ✓ Sufficient knowledge of the language of instruction
- Basic study stage completed or at least 3 semesters completed in a Bachelor's course
- ✓ Above-average academic qualification (top 25%)
- Confirmation by the home university that the academic achievements completed abroad will be recognized



Programs working both ways example 2: ISAP - Amount of Funding

German students:

Foreign students:

- monthly fellowship payment Rates for the U.S.: undergraduates €425 graduates €975
 country-dependent flat-rate travel allowance U.S. (eastern part) €650 U.S. (western part) €975
 monthly allowance for health insurance cover
- monthly allowance for health insurance cover
- possibly tuition fees (max. 50% of the standard fees)
- funds for language courses and tutorials at the German university up to a maximum of €3,000 per academic year
- monthly allowance towards subsistence costs (only for developing countries and countries in transition)



Programs working both ways example 2: ISAP - Amount of Funding (continued)

Lecturers (teaching assignments):

- Support for lectureships by German university teachers at the foreign partner university in the form of a flat-rate travel allowance (length of stay generally 2 weeks to 3 months)
- Support for lectureships by foreign university teachers on teaching assignments at the German university in the form of a flat-rate subsistence payment (daily allowance)


Preparing applications:

- Travel allowances for German university teachers to initiate partnerships (country-dependent flat-rate travel allowance)

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

German ISAP Students – Distribution by Target Countries (2006)



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North American - German ISAP-Projects since 1999/2000




Number of ISAP-Projects

Programs working both ways example 2: ISAP – major benefits and obstacles

Benefits:

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Recognition guaranteed, no loss of time


- \checkmark Help with day to day problems at partner university
- ✓ Student exchange fostered by university cooperation

Obstacles:

- ✓ Lack of balance (reciprocity), particularly from North America
- ✓ Tuition fees (min. 50% tuition waiver), particularly from Germany

A Program to intensify joint curriculum development

funding for degree courses worldwide which award graduates having completed their studies at a German and a foreign university with a double degree made up of the two respective national degrees or a joint degree



Programs working both ways example 3: Integrated Double Degree Courses – facts and figures

Integrated double degree study courses

- ✓ 72 courses supported in 2006/7
- \checkmark with institutions of higher education in 26 countries
- ✓ most popular: Poland, Spain, Italy, China...
- ✓ master's degree courses predominant (64%)
- ✓ pioneered by Franco-German study courses supported by "Deutsch-Französische Hochschule"

Programs working both ways example 3: Integrated Double Degree Courses - Profile

The essential criteria projects have to meet are:

- ✓ two degrees double or joint
- ✓ ~ half of total study time at partner institution
- ✓ students forming joint group
- ✓ joint study programme, regulations and exams
- ✓ intercultural surplus value




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Programs working both ways example 4: Opportunities for Internationalizing Teaching

- DAAD Visiting Professors Program
- \checkmark 1 month to 4 years, depending on model
- \checkmark Compensation according to the salary scales for German universities
- \checkmark Additional allowances for travel, luggage and health insurance
- \checkmark Co-financing by the German university
- \checkmark Application by the German university to DAAD Bonn
- ✓ 180 stays of North American scholars since program started in 1997



Short Term professorship - "Kurzzeitdozentur":

- \checkmark 1-6 months, co-financing by host university
- \checkmark DAAD covers travel costs and provides daily/monthly allowances
- ✓ Applications have to be submitted to DAAD Bonn





Individuals are funded within the framework of well-defined research proposals necessitating international co-operation.

Special emphasis lies on the support of young scholars, i.e. graduate students working on their thesis, Ph.D. and postdoctoral students.

The DAAD grants an allowance to the German participants for travel and residence costs.

Primary financing for the co-operative research project, including personnel costs, must be provided by other sources on both sides.

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Barriers for US Students

- Students think that their knowledge of German is not adequate.
- Many **curricula** are highly proscribed and discouraging of "time off".
- Faculty is not convinced of the value of study or work abroad.
- Credit transfer of coursework done in Germany is difficult.
- The German academic calendar is inconvenient.
- Financial pressure forces students to work during break periods.
- Students do not see the value of adding global experience to their portfolio.

How to reach students

Marketing is essential: the Young Ambassadors Program

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Undergraduate students from North America who have recently studied in Germany and are promoting study in Germany at their home universities and colleges.

General conclusions

Exchange activities between North America and Germany are numerous and flourishing. With regard to future development, emphasis should be put on:

- ✓ Growing numbers
- ✓ Activities on all levels of higher education (starting from high school)
- ✓ High academic quality (integration of PhD level)
- ✓ Generous recognition of awards and credits
- $\checkmark\,$ A balanced mix of individual mobility and exchange programs
- ✓ Readiness for compromise regarding balanced exchange numbers
- ✓ Extension of European mobility dynamics towards North America



General conclusions (continued)

DAA

What should be done to convince even more students and staff that a stay abroad is worth-wile:

- From North America towards Germany:
- ✓ More and better offer of English language degree courses in Germany
- ✓ Flexible options for duration of stay, more offers of short term visits
- ✓ Focus on structured exchange of PhD students
- From Germany towards North America:
- $\checkmark\,$ Generous regulations concerning tuition fees and waivers
- \checkmark More options for the completion of full study cycles at partner Universities
- Taking into account the new Bologna study structure and finding ways of coping with its deviations from North American standards
